JOEL AND THE EVENTS OF THE LAST DAYS


Many New Testament passages provide insight into the events of the *last days*. In addition to the Olivet Discourse (Matthew 24-25) and the book of Revelation, eschatological passages can be found in <u>Luke 17:20-37</u>, <u>21:8-24</u>; <u>Mark 13:5-37</u>; <u>2 Tim. 3:1-9</u>; <u>1 Tim. 4:1-5</u>; <u>2 Thess. 2:1-12</u>; <u>I Thess. 5:1-11</u>; <u>1 Cor. 15:50-58</u>; <u>1 Thess. 4:13-18</u> and <u>2 Peter 3:1-18</u>.

Many do not realize that many eschatological passages can be found in the Old Testament. For example, there is more information on the <u>Millennial</u> Reign of Christ in the Old Testament than in the New Testament.

This article notes how the small, three-chapter, Old Testament book of Joel presents important prophetic information that is echoed centuries later by Jesus in the Olivet Discourse, and decades later by John in the book of Revelation.

Joel's writing is deep and layered with meaning. Joel writes of invasions from Assyrian and Babylonian armies and uses the imagery of destructive locusts to warn people of coming horrors. Those invasions occurred exactly as foretold, but as horrible as the Assyrian and Babylonian attacks were, they are but shadows of the terrible last-days events Joel's prophetic message also points to—the events profiled in the Book of Revelation.

The chart on the next page profiles how Jesus' teaching on the events of the *last days* parallel what the prophet Joel wrote approximately 800 years before Jesus presented the Olivet Discourse.



How Joel, John, and Jesus profile events of the Last Days

How Joel Profiles Events of The Last Days

The three chapters of Joel correlate with the 1) The season of the "birth pains" 2) <u>Tribulation</u>-period events, and 3) events associated with the Millennial Reign of Christ.

Much of Joel (and much of Scripture) serves as a call to turn to God. Forgiveness is promised and grace is given to those who repent and turn to the Father.

The call is to turn to God and avert (or escape from, via the <u>Rapture</u>) the judgments Scripture notes are coming. Those entrusted with insight into the lateness of the hour are to study, watch, share, and warn as God leads, for the day of the return of the Lord draws near.

The admonition in Joel reads: "Blow the trumpet...sound the alarm...for the <u>day of the</u> <u>Lord</u> is coming, [indeed] it is at hand." (<u>Joel 2:1</u>)
